

How Can I Use Data to Inform My Work?

Raise awareness within a school or school district

- Alert teachers, administrators, and other staff to the prevalence of student homelessness
- Promote trauma sensitivity and inclusivity
- O Bolster tools for identifying students in need of key supports

Create targeted and responsive programs


- Leverage school budgets and donations to build more comprehensive supports
- Put resources behind needed services
- NCHE's <u>Getting to Graduation</u> report outlines some key strategies for using data to build effective programs



How Can I Use Data to Inform My Work?

Community awareness

- Improve referrals and collaborations
- Communicate with local <u>Head Start programs about</u> <u>prioritizing students experiencing homelessness</u>
- Raise money and increase donations
- Increase visibility of programs/policies that work well or need improvement
- Influence community perspectives on homelessness



Webinar Scope in Context



Qualitative Data

- Expressed using words or language
- Anecdotes
- Surveys

Quantitative Data

- Expressed using numbers and values
- Attendance, Test scores, grades, etc

Data Accessed Through School / Protected

- Often includes personal information (protected by FERPA)
- More likely to be "realtime"

Publicly-Available Data

- Aggregate
- Summarizes past records

Process: Data Collected by Schools

- Data on student homelessness are collected by schools in student-level databases.
- O Data flow to NYSED and US DOE.
- Student homelessness data are based on McKinney-Vento definition of homelessness.
 - Total counts typically reflect students identified as experiencing homelessness over the course of a school year (not pointin-time).



McKinney-Vento Definition of Homelessness




Includes:

- Sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- Abandoned in hospitals
- Living in a public or private place not designed for sleeping
- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, etc.
- Migratory living in circumstances described above


Supporting Students, Not Stereotypes

2020 Graduation Rates

64% of students who experienced homelessness graduated in 4 years



86% of students who did not experience homelessness graduated in 4 years





Research Questions

- How many students experienced homelessness last year in my community?
 - School district (or charter school)
 - County
 - BOCES region
- In my county, what is the breakdown of students experiencing homelessness by grade?
- In my county, what is the breakdown of students experiencing homelessness by primary nighttime residence?
- Going further: How can SIRS data, collected by schools, be used alongside data from HUD's <u>annual</u> <u>point-in-time counts of individuals experiencing</u> homelessness?

Research Questions

- Did my school district possibly under-identify students experiencing homelessness?
 - If so, how can we expand awareness in the district or community?
- Going further: If I work at a charter school, what data do I have on students living in poverty?
 - Can I estimate the number of students experiencing homelessness based on this value or the <u>rate of</u> <u>homelessness in the underlying district</u>?

NYSED: Graduation Rates

- **Statewide**
- By District



Filters, in addition to housing status:

- Gender
- Race/Ethnicity
- Needs/Resource Capacity Category (Statewide)

Research Questions

- How does the graduation rate for students who experienced homelessness in my district compare to the graduation rate for non-homeless students?
- What types of diplomas are students receiving?
- How many students transferred to GED programs?
- How many students dropped out?
- How does the graduation rate for students who experienced homelessness compare to students who are economically disadvantaged?
- How do graduation rates compare for various student demographics, such as race and gender?

NYSED: Report Card <u>Database</u>

Available in the Downloads section of NYSED's Data Site

Includes, by housing status:

- Elementary ELA, Math Tests
- Regents Exams
- NYSESLAT (English Language Proficiency)

Pathways Database (12.1 megabytes)

This database contains graduation pathway data for the state as well as by coun public school and charter school. Pathway data is included for the current four-year June and August, and six-year June and August.

Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) Da

This database contains counts of AP and IB assessments by student subgroup ar and an AP and IB course researcher file by student subgroup. School district, sta aggregations are included.

3-8 Assessment Database (73.09 megabytes)

This database contains assessment data for grades 3-8 on ELA and Math at the s district, and school level broken down by various subgroups.

Report Card Database (317.96 megabytes)


This database contains annual assessment, accountability, expenditures per pup state as well as by county, Need to Resource Capacity group, district, public scho

Student and Educator Database (5.13 megabytes)

This database contains free and reduced-price lunch, average class size, student teacher attendance, and teacher turnover data.

Note: LEA-level data are duplicated at the state level, meaning that a student who experienced homelessness in multiple districts may be counted in the file under multiple districts.

 - Children with one or more disabilities

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


